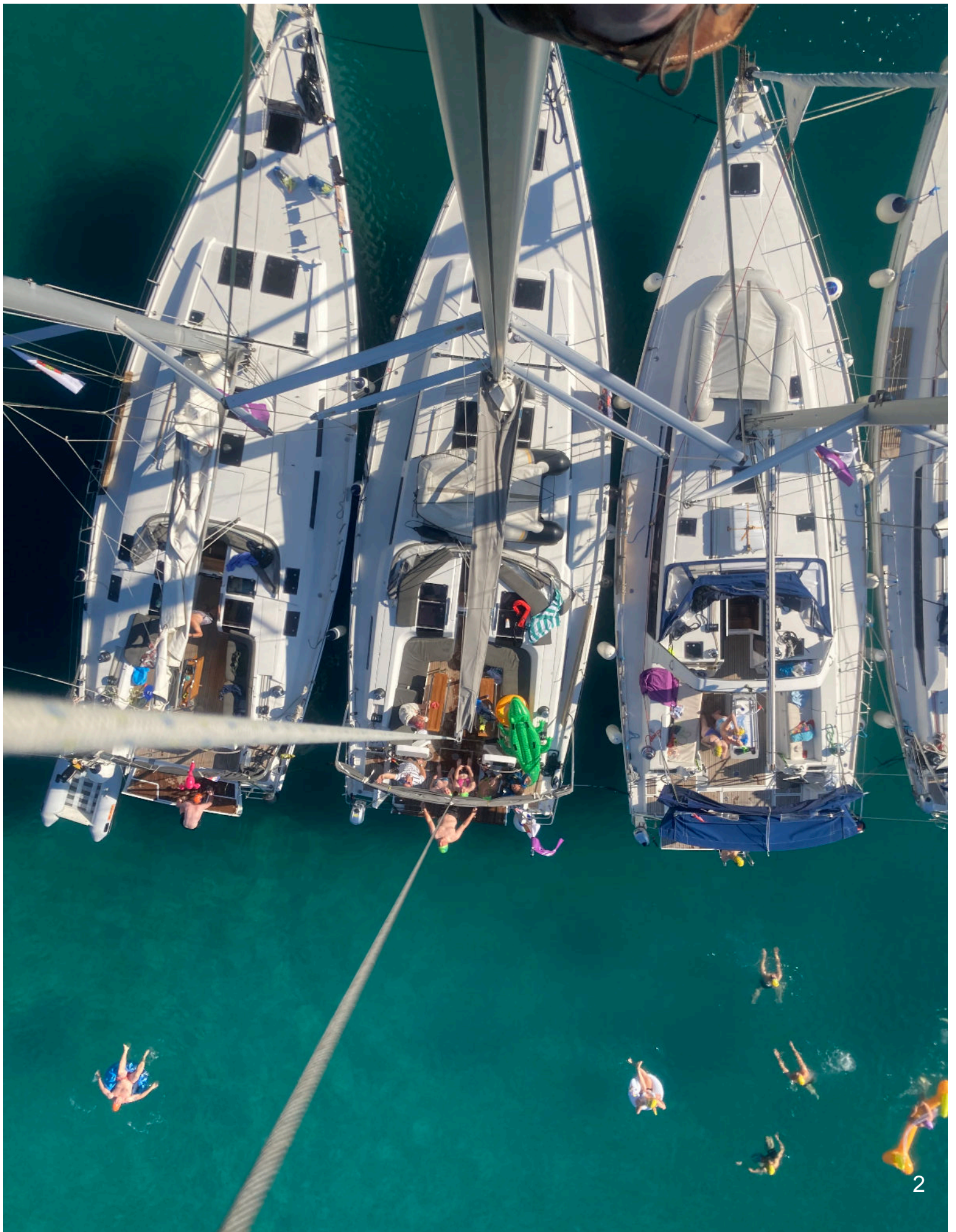

The Board of Trustees have been focused this year on supporting Craig and his team as they worked to bring our members back to face-to-face meetings and events following the pandemic. Many of the Trustees have been able to get out and about and visit these events which has been fantastic to see. One many Trustees visited was Red Rose 2022. It was great to see this event in full flow and listen to the young people attending describing the amazing experience they were having.

We have much to offer our communities, but they have so much to share with us and so this new committee will be focused on developing our external relationships.

A year in review from the County Commissioner



A Year in Review:

This year will be remembered as a year where we worked together, rolled our sleeves up and delivered great adventures for the young people of Lancashire, at a time when it was needed the most. Our County Commissioner reflects on a year which has seen us bounce back...

The last few years have reminded us all how truly special Scouting is. We bring people together, from different generations and different communities and learn that we have more in common. We help one another, we help our communities, and we live by our Scouting values. It is that spirit of Scouting, that has steered our organisation through the challenges of the pandemic, to this point: an organisation which is bouncing back with vigour and enormous strength.

The impact of the pandemic on young people is still being felt. A rise in mental health issues, a deterioration of social skills and feelings of isolation are common. These are challenging times. Yet we remain determined to reach more young people through exciting programmes that deliver true skills for life. We've extended our reach, and work with approximately 10,000 young people every week across nearly every community in our County. We've witnessed, first hand, the joy of bringing young people together and giving them the opportunity to learn new skills, work in teams, explore the outdoors, try new adventurous activities, travel the World and be part of something bigger; part of something special.

We've made huge steps forward in achieving our goals in each of the four pillars of our strategy:

Programme

- ❑ We've seen the return of our large-scale County Events in all sections. We've also introduced new events like 'Puddle and Waddle' for Beaver Scouts and Patrol Leaders Camp in Scouts.
 - ❑ Over 100 Scouts, Explorers and Scout Network members gathered at Blackpool Pleasure Beach in February to take the lead on shaping the future of our movement as part of our Youth Shape Event.
 - ❑ More than 40 Explorer Scouts, Network Members and leaders took part in a sailing expedition around Croatia. They combined adventurous activities with international programmes and delivered the only Scout International Trip in the UK last year.
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- ✓ 7676 nights away from home were completed by our Young People.
 - ✓ 469 Beaver Scouts (aged 6-8) achieved their Chief Scout Bronze Award.
 - ✓ 466 Cub Scouts (aged 8-11) achieved their Chief Scout Silver Award.
 - ✓ 238 Scouts (aged 11-14) achieved their Chief Scout Gold Award.
 - ✓ 138 Explorer Scouts (aged 14-18) achieved a range of top awards including Queen Scout Awards.
 - ✓ 29 Network Members included a range of top awards including Queen Scout Awards, Scouts of the World Award and Explorer Belts.
 - ✓ Over 400 young people (aged 14-18) participated in our Young Leaders Scheme- supporting the delivery of programmes in younger sections, whilst developing their own skills.



Perception:

- ✓ We appointed our first ever Scout Ambassador, Olympic Skier Dave Ryding.
- ✓ We've delivered over 100 assemblies in Primary Schools to ensure all young people, in every community, know about what The Scouts has to offer.
- ✓ We've increased the regularity of our communications to members, with a fortnightly newsletter.
- ✓ We've increased our output on social media channels and introduced new channels to communicate with a wider audience.
- ✓ Our adult volunteers continue to contribute more than £2 million to the local economy in youth and community services every year.
- ✓ Our new External Relations Committee have been identifying and forming new partnerships with businesses across the community.

More young people

People:

- ✓ Overall membership increased by 13% - our largest one-year membership growth in our history.
- ✓ We have started the roll out of the first new programme section in 35 years for 4-6 year olds, Squirrels. We've opened 10 new Squirrel dreys and counting...
- ✓ We opened 18 new sections to support the increased demand for Scouting.
- ✓ We welcomed 1400 more young people than in the previous year.
- ✓ We saw an increase of 3% in adult volunteers working directly with young people.
- ✓ We enjoyed our 22nd year of growth in female membership proving that Scouting really is for everybody.
- ✓ We've seen an increase in members from Black and Minority Ethnic Backgrounds as well as an increase in members with additional needs and disabilities.
- ✓ We've trained mental health first aiders for young people and adults in every part of our County.
- ✓ We've seen over 800 adult volunteers complete training courses ranging from first aid to fire-lighting!
- ✓ In the last year, 217 of our incredible volunteers have been recognised with a Good Service Award for their service to Scouting. You can find out about all the awardees here: <https://cms.scouts.org.uk/media/18110/2022-roll-of-honour-updated-090822.pdf>

Places:

- ✓ We secured a significant grant of £46,750 from BBC Children in Need to further develop our activity and facilities provision.
- ✓ The team at Waddecar have introduced new water activities, crossbow shooting and a new low ropes course. Our archery facilities have also been upgraded.
- ✓ The recently installed high-ropes complex, new tented village and tomahawk activities have proved extremely popular with the return of face-to-face Scouting.
- ✓ Be Prepared- The Story of Scouting and Guiding, or the 'Little Gem' is an outstanding facility that showcases the history of Scouting and Guiding and is based at Waddecar. It is the first purpose-built museum of its kind, and the envy of the Scouting community around the World.
- ✓ The Waddecar Management Committee are drawing up ambitious new plans for further developments at Waddecar, including plans for a new activity centre.

The above achievements are just a few highlights of the incredible things that have been achieved this year. They demonstrate clearly the breadth of talent we have in the volunteers in our County, our ambition, and our determination to give every young person a better start in life. My sincere thanks to every single person who contributes to our continued success. Thank you!

Statement of the Trustees


