Scouts continues to grow, with even more young people joining in West Lancs this year, all gaining skills for life.

It has been another great year in West Lancs Scouts as we continue to offer amazing opportunities for our young people and adult volunteers. We have begun our work to transform volunteering to make it easier, more enjoyable and rewarding. This has included changes to our structure and ensuring we can operate in a way that allows us to support more volunteers to offer amazing life-changing adventures for young people in our communities.

**Transformation:** The power of Scouts to change lives, communities and society in general is clear and we want to continue this work. We have rolled out our Transformation strategy and built teams to ensure we can make volunteering more flexible and easier to begin. This transformation work is explained in our report. Our Trustee Board has also looked at how it operates and has proposed a new constitution and structure to be approved at our AGM. This will ensure that we can continue to focus on good charity governance and allow our Leadership Team the time to focus on support and operational tasks to provide brilliant Scouting to our communities.



**Positive Growth:** We've had another year of growth with more young people wanting to be part of our adventure and adults wanting to join us and help shape the lives of young people and their own. Planning permission has now been approved and a Project Delivery Team is now in place ready to make our vision into reality. By providing an enhanced and larger accommodation facility we can engage with more young people and allow them to enjoy our amazing facility at Waddecar and wonderful Scouting activities. We will need all our supporters and volunteers to work with our team to ensure we move the vision into reality as soon as we can.

We've done that by helping even more young people from across Lancashire gain skills for life. Our 50th Year has been a year of celebration, challenge and change.

For 50 years West Lancashire Scouts has been a leading light in the voluntary youth sector; providing young people with skills for life, life-long friendships and incredible adventures that inspire them to do more and be more.

This year has been no different and we've seen the very best of Scouting – all delivered by our 3000 adult volunteers.

The year has not been without challenge. The World Scout Jamboree in Korea tested our young people and adults beyond measure, and in true Scouting spirit they made the most of a difficult situation. Nationally, we've also been committed to learning from the tragic death of Explorer Scout Ben Leonard, ensuring that we are supporting our volunteers to deliver great activities safely.

This year Andrew Hobson has been leading our transformation work and preparing us all for change. We've embraced team based volunteering and restructured our County teams to better support the movement and make our volunteer roles simpler and easier to understand. We've reformed some of our governance procedures, started using new role titles and preparing for a new membership system in the months ahead.

50 years on, and West Lancashire Scouts are still innovating and moving forward. This year we've seen the establishment of more Squirrel Dreys and growth in both our youth and adult membership. More young people have achieved top awards than in the previous year. We've got planning permission for our new accommodation block at Waddecar. # Programme

**Aim:** A fun, enjoyable, high quality programme consistently delivering and supported by simple (digital) tools.

## Goals

- An inspiring programme developing Skills For Life.
- More young people experiencing overseas scouting than ever before.
- Inclusive international scouting opportunities for all our youth members.
- Outdoor and adventurous activities at the heart of our programme.
- More nights away opportunities for all our members.
- Our young people will achieve more top awards than ever before.

## Progress:

- Young people enjoyed 32,859 nights away from home this year.
- We've had over 11,000 young people attend our County Events and increase of 3000 in the previous year.
- As part of our transformation work we've established new teams focusing on programme delivery and increasing the number of permit holders for adventurous activities.
- We showcased our wide range of international and adventurous activities events at our Overseas and Adventure evening, attended by hundreds of people.

- We've seen an increase in the number of adults completing adventurous activity permits this year.
- We launched our County Challenge providing great programme activities linked to our 50th anniversary year.
- Our volunteers have delivered a record 9 international trips sending 400 young people overseas on Scouting Adventures to places including South Korea, Budapest and Croatia.

## The Achievements of our Young People:

- 99 Squirrel Scouts (aged 4-6) achieved the Chief Scout Acorn Awards – An increase of 93 awards on the previous year.
- 711 Beaver Scouts (aged 6-8) achieved their Chief Scout Bronze Award. An increase of 161 awards on the previous year.
- 624 Cub Scouts (Aged 8-11) achieved their Chief Scout Silver Award. An increase of 64 awards on the previous year.
- 282 Scouts (aged 11-14) achieved their Chief Scout Gold Award. An increase of 20 awards on the previous year.
- 204 Explorer Scouts and Scout Network Members achieved a range of top awards including the Queen and King' Scout Award, Duke of Edinburgh Awards, Scouts of the World Award and Explorer Belts. An increase of 6 awards.

# People

**Aim:** More, well trained, better supported and motivated adult volunteers, and more young people from diverse backgrounds.

## Goals

- A high quality, supportive environment for our volunteers.
- As diverse as the communities we operate in.
- Youth shaped scouting at the heart of our operations.
- Build real and lasting relationships in our local communities.

## Progress:

- Overall membership increased by 3%, with a 3% increase in youth membership, and a 3% in adults volunteering in front-line delivery roles.
- We now have 573 sections operating every single week across our County. An increase on last year.
- We've opened 31 brand new Squirrel Sections for our 4 to 6 year-olds, exceeding our target of 30. There are now over 600 young people in Squirrels.
- Emma, our Youth Lead, delivered our first ever 'Ignite' event, which is designed to support young people take on leadership roles in Scouting.
- 318 more young people are accessing Scouting now, compared to last year.
- We've opened brand new sections including at Preston Muslim Girls High School (welcoming another 120 new Scouts) and at Kirkland and Catterall – offering Scouting in places we've not operated before.
- We enjoyed our 24th year of growth in female membership.
- We've seen a further increase in members from Black and Minority Ethnic Backgrounds as well as an increase in members with additional needs and disabilities.
- We're offering Scouting to over 1,600 young people with disabilities.
- We've seen over 850 adult volunteers complete training courses ranging from safeguarding to sailing an increase in the previous year.
- **424** 14–18-year-olds volunteered as part of our young leader's scheme, supporting young people in our youngest sections, and developing as the leaders of today and the future. That's an increase on last year.
- Tom McDonald, Mia Culshaw and Anwar Hussain were award Coronation Medals for their role in supporting the coronation of HM The King.

**Aim:** Scouting is understood, more visible, trusted, respected and widely seen as playing a key role in society today,


## Goals

## Progress:

- We've delivered over 100 assemblies in Primary Schools to ensure all young people, in every community, know about what The Scouts has to offer.
- We've launched a new asset management system to help us manage our assets, including those we share with community partners like our minibus which is shared with Lancashire Wildlife Trust.
- We've benefitted from support and advocacy from a range of community leaders including sporting heroes Dave Ryding and Graeme Thomas.
- Our amazing adult volunteers continue to contribute more than £2 million to the local economy in youth and community services every year.

- The team at Waddecar have added new facilities and renovated existing ones, including the completion of camping pods, cross-bows and new team-building activities.
- Be Prepared- The Story of Scouting and Guiding, or the 'Little Gem' is an outstanding facility that showcases the history of Scouting and Guiding and is based at Waddecar. It is the first purpose-built museum of its kind, and the envy of the Scouting community around the World.
- We've received planning permission for our new accommodation block at Waddecar. Our attention now turns to making this a reality.
- Despite our challenges, there is so much to celebrate. Thank you to every volunteer, staff member and support for helping make this organisation so successful. For over 50 years we've transformed the lives of young people as West Lancashire Scouts, and we are set to go from strength to strength in the years ahead.
